

# Choice Board

I can...

- connect letters with sounds in words
- talk about and explain the meaning of my pictures and print.
- create rhyming words to learn new words.
- sort a set of objects based on a single attribute, and explains the sorting rule.
- Identify and say numbers 1-10
- experiment with sounds, words, word patterns, rhymes and rhythms.
- describe the function of some common objects found in and around the home and the community

<p><b>Go on a rock hunt. How many ways can you sort the rocks? How many rocks did you find? If you'd like, draw a picture of your favourite rock. What makes that rock unique?</b></p>	<p><b>Go on a number walk! Whenever you see a number, say the number that comes before and after that number! Take a picture if you see a number out in your neighborhood!</b></p>	<p><b>Have a word race! Work together with someone in your house to think of as many words as you can that start with the letter M in 2 minutes. Choose your favourite 5 words and draw a picture of each word.</b></p>
<p><b>Summer is coming! Invent a new ice cream flavour and draw a picture of what it would look like. Try to write some words or letters that describe the new ice cream. Tell somebody at your home about your new ice cream flavour and why it will be delicious.</b></p>	<p><b>Gather different loose parts around your house (buttons, rocks, sticks, paper, bottle caps, leaves, cardboard, etc.) and make up a story about somewhere you would like to go on an adventure. Use the loose parts to make a picture of the story and to help you tell the story to someone at home with you.</b></p>	<p><b>How many rhymes can you make? Use the word CAT and try to make 5 different words that rhyme with cat.</b></p>
<p><b>Use the numbers 1-10 to create a new movement game and teach it to someone in your house. Each number you have to do a different movement. (5 jumping jacks, 2 forward bends, 1 frog jump, etc.) I can't wait to see your new number movement game!</b></p>	<p><b>Can you create a map of your community? Where is your house? Are there streets, or sidewalks? What about trees? Can you see our school on the map? What important things can you see and what do they do?</b></p>	<p><b>Find words that you can see in your house or neighborhood and try to sound it out with the help of someone, then try to find how many syllables that word has! Remember, we clap to find how many syllables! Like Ms. Woodward is 3 claps! Try it! How many words can you do?</b></p>
